What I Learned Today

Many students share what they discover through the practical workshops offered by the organisation, including sessions on critical thinking, math tricks, and essential life skills.

From a Critical Thinker, Age Ten

The math problem game was difficult in the beginning, but when the teacher showed the trick, it felt as if my mind opened. I learned that a big problem is only a collection of small problems. Now I know I can solve them. Thank you for making learning feel powerful.

From an Aspiring Artist, Age Nine

My mother often told me to stay quiet, but in the life skills class I learned that my feelings matter. The Emotion Expression Game was the first time I felt safe to show that I was happy, sad, or even scared. Now I understand my friends better as well.

05 The Boy who built “Nutrition Mission”

Arth's Journey



At just sixteen, Arth, a U.S.-based student with deep Indian roots, has emerged as a beacon of youthful humanitarianism, tackling one of India's most persistent challenges: hunger and malnutrition among children in urban slums. His initiative, Hunger to Hope, has steadily grown from a modest act of kindness into a structured program that is reshaping lives in Coolie Camp, Vasant Vihar, one of Delhi's most densely populated and under-resourced communities.

What began as a simple intention to give back has evolved into a daily nutrition initiative, serving 40–50 children with freshly prepared, dietician-approved midday meals at one of the camps adopted by **Hamari Pahchan NGO**. These meals are not only wholesome but also strategically designed to combat protein and vitamin deficiencies, along with nutritional gaps that often hinder healthy growth in vulnerable children.

Since its inception, Hunger to Hope has mobilized over \$10,000 in fundraising, financing more than 15,000 nutritious meals for underprivileged children. Looking forward, Arth envisions a women-managed community kitchen, which will not only ensure steady food provision but also generate employment and foster a sense of ownership within the community.

Education forms a vital pillar of his mission. Once every month, Arth conducts virtual nutrition and hygiene workshops via Zoom, connecting with families to emphasize the importance of balanced diets, clean water, and healthy living. These sessions supported by visual materials and local follow-ups have strengthened awareness among parents, ensuring that the lessons extend beyond the classroom.

Supported and actively assisted by Hamari Pahchan NGO, Arth's initiatives have been executed seamlessly, earning admiration from community members, volunteers, and school staff. The NGO's involvement has ensured logistical support, community engagement, and smooth coordination with local stakeholders. What truly sets this model apart is its structured approach and long-term vision. "It's not just a one-time donation. He's there every week, checking supplies, talking to the cooks, making sure no child goes home hungry," says a local mentor from the NGO.



HUNGER TO HOPE



Beyond these daily interventions, Arth has expanded his efforts to include large-scale food and ration distribution drives. Over the past few months, he has personally spearheaded more than ten such initiatives, providing protein-rich grains, seasonal vegetables, hygiene kits, and essential supplies to families living below the poverty line. These efforts have directly benefited more than 500 individuals, underscoring the program's reach and reliability.

What sets Hunger to Hope apart is its consistency and accountability. Community members attest to Arth's weekly visits overseeing supplies, engaging with cooks, and ensuring that no child leaves school on an empty stomach. His dedication has cultivated trust and set a model of sustained engagement rather than one-off charity.

Looking ahead, with continued support from Hamari Pahchan NGO, Arth plans to scale this project across other Delhi slums, exploring strategic partnerships to enhance outreach and implement more structured nutrition programs for children and mothers.

Although raised in the United States, Arth's connection to India has remained profound. Frequent visits to his parents' homeland exposed him to the stark realities of hunger and poverty, leaving an indelible mark. Hunger

to Hope became his way of leveraging his resources, education, and networks abroad to address urgent social challenges at home. In doing so, Arth exemplifies the transformative role of the global Indian diaspora in bridging resources across continents to foster sustainable development.

Crucially, his work aligns with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 2 (Zero Hunger), moving beyond immediate relief toward long-term solutions. His future roadmap includes expanding the program to other slum clusters in Delhi, developing structured nutrition programs for mothers and children, and undertaking comparative research between hunger relief models in India and the U.S. to adapt and replicate best practices.

As India continues to grapple with alarmingly high child malnutrition rates, Arth's initiative is a timely reminder that social transformation does not always begin in boardrooms or government offices it can be ignited by the vision and determination of a single teenager. Hunger to Hope is more than a food program; it is a movement that nourishes bodies, empowers communities, and redefines what youth-led impact can achieve.

Hunger to Hope

Session at Coolie Camp of Joy

On the 7th of January 2025, the spirit of genuine care and development radiated from **Coolie Camp. Hamari Pahchan** organized **Hunger to Hope**, an initiative dedicated to the holistic well being of the next generation, successfully reaching 50 children aged 9 to 15. This effort aligns perfectly with their core belief: that developing one's identity (Pahchan) begins with health and education.

Knowledge First: The Interactive Session

Thanks to the generous support and active presence of **Arth and Avni Bhardwaj**, the event was transformed from a simple food distribution into a powerful **educational workshop**. Before the meals, Arth and Avni led an engaging, interactive session focused on nutrition and healthy eating habits.

The children were highly receptive, participating enthusiastically in discussions about:

Essential Nutrients and their specific benefits for growth.

Practical Tips on how to incorporate nutritious food into daily life.

This focus ensured that the children left empowered with knowledge, not just satisfied bellies.

Smiles and Sustenance

Following the session, balanced meals (including **Thaali Curry Rice, Chapati, and mixed veg Curry**) were distributed. The overwhelming happiness and sincere gratitude expressed by the children were the clearest testament to the event's success and the immediate relief provided.

Lasting Impact and Gratitude

It provided immediate nourishment and empowered 50 young individuals with knowledge that will shape their health for years.

Young women transforming Rural Communities

Across India's rural landscapes, young women are stepping into leadership roles that were once unimaginable. They are not waiting for permission, not waiting for systems to change, they are changing them from within.

In villages where opportunities are often limited, these girls are challenging generational barriers with courage that feels both quiet and revolutionary. Some are running community classes under a banyan tree. Some are training other girls in digital literacy. Some are leading menstrual hygiene workshops, forming youth groups, or managing micro-initiatives like nutrition drives, waste management, tutoring younger children, or advocating for safe public spaces.

Their leadership doesn't always look like big speeches. Sometimes it looks like a 16-year-old teaching a 10-year-old multiplication, or a college girl convincing mothers to send their daughters to school. What makes their impact powerful is not scale, but intention. They lead from care, from lived experience, and from a clear belief: **"If I rise, other girls will rise with me."**

Rural India's future is being shaped quietly, in courtyards, classrooms, and self-help groups by girls who choose to stand up, speak up, and lift their communities with them.



Timeline

2015

Government and NGO-led programs bring digital literacy to rural girls, enabling the first generation of “village tech mentors.”

2017

Youth-led self-help groups emerge where teenage girls begin micro community projects such as hygiene drives, tutoring circles, and skill sharing.

2019

Girls lead community awareness sessions on menstrual health, breaking stigma across schools and villages.

2020

During COVID, young women become local problem-solvers, distributing ration kits, teaching younger children outdoors, and ensuring girls stay in school.

2021

Rural girls start community leadership clubs focused on sanitation, environment protection, and gender equality.

2022

More girls join district-level Youth Councils, becoming the voice of their villages in decision-making spaces.



A growing Rural Young Women Leaders Network forms through NGOs, scaling leadership training, entrepreneurship, and community projects.

These include digital literacy sessions, essential life skills, and vocational training that align with the needs of the modern workforce. 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Drishti: Education for All

In a country as populous and diverse as India, the promise of **Education** for All remains both urgent and challenging. Millions of children still lack access to quality education or drop out before realizing their potential. In this landscape, campaigns like **Drishti**, run by Hamari Pahchan, play a critical role: not as replacements for governmental action, but as partners helping to close gaps.

Why “**Education for All**” is Still a Critical Cause? Despite constitutional mandates and massive public expenditure, implementation lags in reach, quality, retention, and equality. Under-resourced schools, insufficient infrastructure, lack of digital tools, and socioeconomic barriers all contribute to children being left behind.

Hamari Pahchan & the Drishti Initiative: Hamari Pahchan is a Delhi-based **NGO founded in 2015**. Its mission is to empower marginalized communities “**to build their Pahchan (identity) with dignity and independence.**” One of its flagship projects is Drishti: an education-centred campaign that aims at bridging the gap between privileged and underprivileged children.

While many sympathize with the underprivileged, few take action to make a difference. My association with Hamari Pahchan allowed me to bridge that gap—gaining insights into the struggles of underprivileged women and contributing toward their empowerment.

As part of the initiative, I authored a write-up, organized a fundraiser, and designed a poster to raise awareness about the importance of providing women opportunities to learn, grow, and strengthen our economy.

I am grateful to Hamari Pahchan for this meaningful experience and look forward to contributing to similar initiatives in the future.

What Drishti Does: Goals, Activities, and Impact

Goals: Bridge the privilege gap; develop basic life skills (communication, character building); and improve quality through engagement.

Activities: Weekly remedial classes, distribution of textbooks & stationery, vocational training, and the “Gadgetshala” initiative (integration of digital tools to make learning interactive).

Impact So Far: Since its inception, Drishti has helped over 11,250 children with education access and supplementary support.

How Drishti Addresses Gaps, That Policy Alone Can't, NGOs like Drishti fulfil roles that policies often underperform in:

Personal Attention: Weekly classes and workshops fill the need for individual and remedial attention.

Material Support: Distributions reduce barriers caused by the cost of textbooks, stationery, or digital devices.

Life Skills: Workshops provide exposure to skills like basic computing or vocational training that academic literacy often overlooks.

Digital Inclusion: Gadgetshala addresses digital exclusion by providing tools and instruction where connectivity is often poor.

Conclusion: Education is the bedrock upon which individual dignity and national progress rest. Hamari Pahchan's Drishti campaign is a powerful example of how civil society can move the needle: by supplementing formal education with materials, attention, skill support, digital tools, and compassionate reach. Scaling with quality and sustained support is what will ultimately determine whether every child counts.

THE FUTURE OF VOLUNTEERING-

For decades, **volunteering** was often seen as a noble but separate activity something you did on the side, usually involving manual labor or simple fundraising. Similarly, **Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)** often felt like a formal, distant mechanism: a company writing a large cheque, or sponsoring a marathon once a year to look good.

But that era is over.

Today's youth the digital natives, the global citizens, the generation raised on climate action and social justice are demanding something far more genuine and hands-on. They aren't just looking for places to donate an hour; they're looking for opportunities to drive structural change. And in doing so, they are fundamentally redefining what **CSR** means for the world, and right here in Delhi with organizations like **Hamari Pahchan**.

First, What Exactly is CSR?

In simple, human terms, Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) is a business model where companies commit to operating ethically and contributing to social good. It goes beyond legal obligations. It's about a company consciously considering its impact on the planet, people, and communities.



Key Pillars of CSR often include:

Environmental Efforts: Reducing carbon footprints, sustainable practices.

Ethical Labour Practices: Fair wages, good working conditions.

Volunteering & Philanthropy: Donating money or time to causes.

The critical difference now? Youth are shifting CSR from **philanthropy** (simple giving) to partnership (active collaboration).

The Great Shift: From Transactional to Transformative

The traditional volunteer model was transactional: "I give my time, you get manual help." The modern youth-led model is transformative: "I bring my specific skills, I challenge your assumptions, and together, we create a scalable solution."

Young people today are not just painting walls; they are coding apps for NGOs, designing social media campaigns, consulting on supply chain ethics, and teaching digital literacy. They want their involvement to be a meaningful professional development experience, not just a feel-good chore.

This generation judges brands and employers not just by their products, but by their purpose. A company that allows a young marketing intern to spend paid time volunteering with Hamari Pahchan to design our new outreach strategy? That's true CSR, and that's what attracts and retains the best young talent.



The New Pillars of Impact

1. Skills-Based Giving: Pro Bono Power

The era of just manual labour is fading. Today's most impactful volunteer uses their professional skills like coding, design, strategy, or finance, to create scalable, systemic solutions for NGOs like Hamari Pahchan. This "Pro Bono" power multiplies the value of their time, offering organizations access to top-tier expertise.

2. Digital Natives: Transparency & Reach

This generation leverages technology to its fullest. They use social media for powerful advocacy, participate in virtual mentorship, and demand real-time impact tracking. Their digital fluency forces a higher degree of authenticity and transparency from both corporate partners and the causes they support.

3. Demand for Systemic Authenticity

Young people won't stand for "impact-washing." They require corporations to demonstrate genuine, systemic change across their entire operation, not just a one-off donation. For them, CSR must be integrated into the core business strategy, proving that the commitment is real and measurable.

4. Mutual Growth: A Shared Pahchan

Volunteering is no longer a one-way gift. It is an exchange where youth gain critical skills like leadership, resilience, and problem-solving essential for their careers. This mutual growth strengthens the collective identity (Hamari Pahchan), proving that serving the community is serving one's own future.

Dear Future,

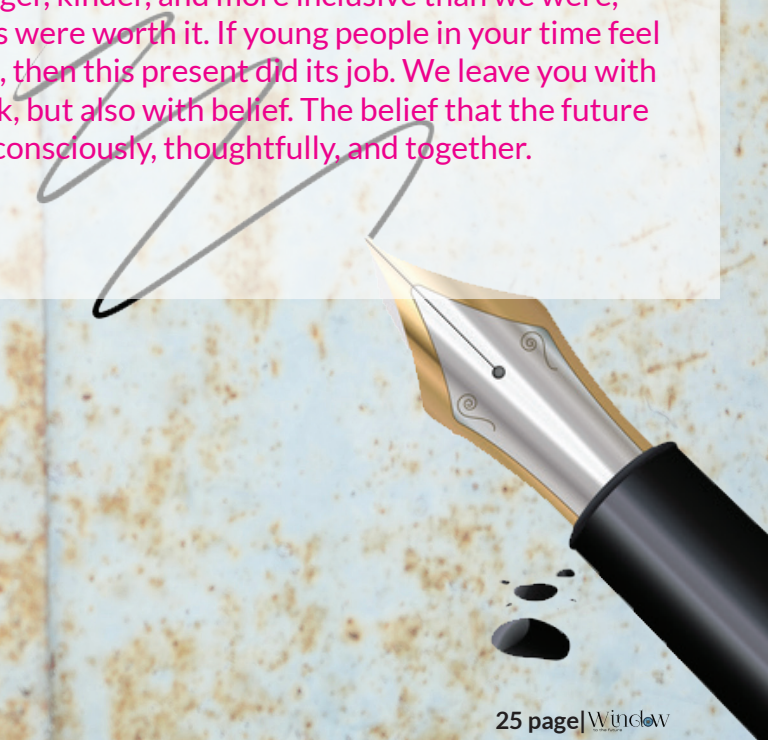

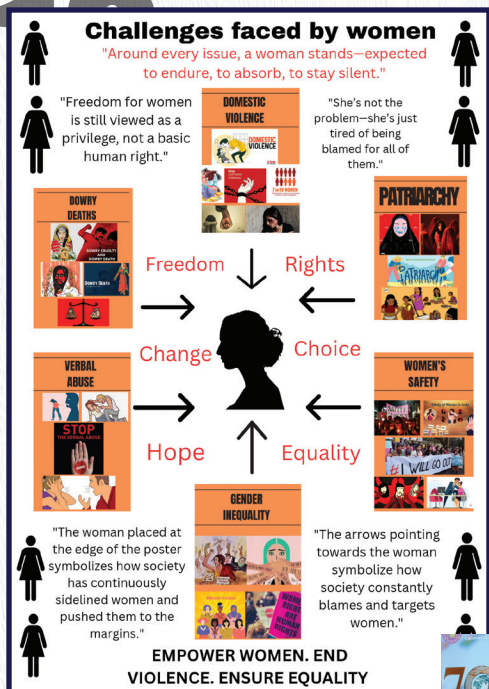
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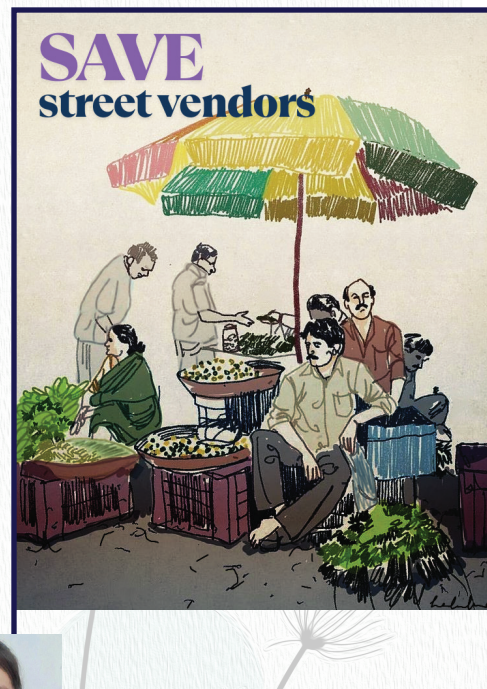

15 RESEARCH STUDENT GUIDE

What is Research?

Good research is the process of collecting information and evidence in an organized way to find reliable answers to specific questions. It turns simple ideas into verifiable facts.

Four Requirements for Quality Research

1. **Clarity and Focus:**
The research question must be narrow, specific, and answerable.
It defines a clear scope and objective for the study.
2. **Credibility (Reliability and Validity):**
Reliability: Means the study can be repeated by others with similar outcomes.
Validity: Ensures the study actually measures what it claims to measure.
3. **Originality and Contribution:**
The research must introduce a new perspective, a new dataset, or apply existing knowledge to a new context.
It must advance the overall understanding of the topic.
4. **Ethical Responsibility:**
Mandates respect for all participants, ensuring anonymity and informed consent.
Requires honest, unbiased reporting of all data and findings.

Importance

In the **social sector**, good research is the necessary foundation for real, **lasting change**.

Four Reasons of Importance

Replaces Intentions with Proof: It generates the hard evidence (**metrics, data points, analysis**) that proves a program or intervention is effective. This evidence is crucial for securing resources.

Drives Policy and Funding: Trusted findings influence strategic decisions by non-profits, corporate partners, and the government. Data helps shift resources toward solutions that are proven to work.

Empowers the Community: By gathering and sharing clear information about local needs and outcomes, research gives communities a strong, evidence-based voice for self-advocacy.

Builds Personal Value (Pahchan): Conducting and publishing research demonstrates high-level critical thinking, analytical skills, and the ability to create new knowledge, which is invaluable for academic and career advancement.

RESEARCH #1

RESEARCH #2

OLD AGE HOME VISIT A DAY OF LEARNING AND CONNECTION

"A visit to an old age home is more than a social activity. It is a reminder of the value of time companionship and empathy. Our youth volunteers and college students from Hamari Pahchan spent a full day with the elderly residents to understand their lives their stories and the challenges they face every day. This visit was not just an experience. It became a lesson on kindness patience and respect."



Our team went to the old age home with a simple aim. To sit with the residents talk to them share moments and make them feel heard. Many of them do not have family support. Some live away from their children. Most of them miss regular conversations and emotional warmth.

When the students entered the home the atmosphere was quiet. Slowly everything changed. Smiles started appearing. Stories began to flow. The residents welcomed the young visitors with open hearts. They were excited to talk about their past their memories and their hopes.

The visit helped the students understand how loneliness affects older adults. They learned that the elderly do not always need material help.



WHAT THE STUDENTS EXPERIENCED

Conversations and Stories

The residents shared stories from their childhood their work life and the time when families lived together under one roof. The students listened with great interest. Many said it felt like talking to their own grandparents.

Learning About Loneliness

The visit made students aware of how isolation affects older people. The elderly spoke about how festivals evenings and meals feel empty without family. This made the volunteers understand the importance of spending time with them even if for a few hours.

Activities and Warm Moments

The team played indoor games sang old songs and even shared a small snack time. Laughter filled the room. Some residents held the students hands while talking. It showed how much human touch and presence matter.

Emotional Takeaway

The students left with mixed emotions. They felt happy to bring joy for a day but also sad about the everyday loneliness the residents experience. Many volunteers said they wish to come again. Some offered to visit during festivals so the residents do not feel left out.

WHY THIS VISIT MATTERS

- It builds a bridge between youth and the elderly
- It teaches young people empathy and gratitude
- It brings emotional comfort to older adults
- It encourages society to look at ageing with respect and care

CONCLUSION

The old age home visit reminded everyone that ageing is a natural part of life and every person deserves love and dignity. A single day spent with the residents created memories on both sides. The students returned with a deeper understanding of human values.

This moment from the old age home visit shows the heart of Hamari Pahchan's work. The intern sits with the elderly residents and listens to their stories with patience and genuine interest. The atmosphere is quiet yet full of warmth. The residents open up slowly sharing memories that still matter to them. The intern listens softly giving them the comfort of being heard and understood.

Hamari Pahchan encourages young people to spend time with older generations because these simple conversations create real learning. The interns discover how much wisdom and experience the seniors hold. They also see how much a little attention can brighten someone's day. The elderly feel valued again and

the youth carry back lessons that shape their thinking and their way of seeing the world.

This picture reflects a gentle idea. The future becomes better when the young learn to care and the old feel respected. Moments like this remind society that kindness is powerful and human connection is the first step toward a more thoughtful future.

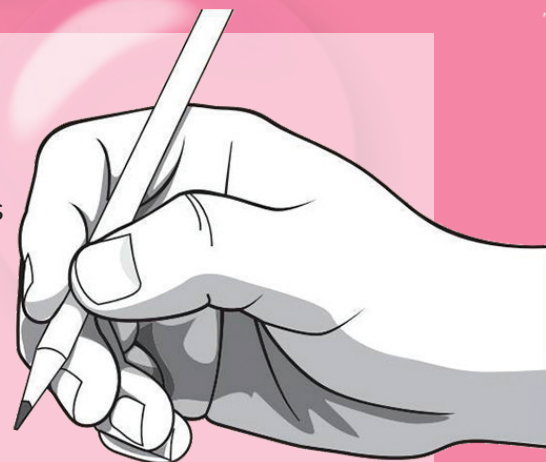

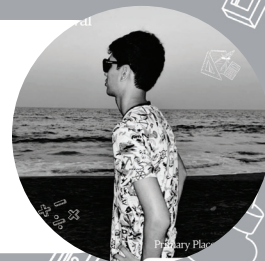
Jai Gupta started **Project W.I.R.E.D. (Wandering into Robotics Education)**, providing hands-on robotics and coding training to over **400 children** from low-income communities. He made complex STEM concepts feel fun and possible, helping students unlock their potential.



Rhea Goel developed **Project GDP (Growing through Development & Policy)** to teach underserved schoolgirls the fundamentals of economics and public policy. She created original tools like a budget worksheet and used interactive classes to encourage critical thinking.



Aryan Agarwal's Project **TechTales** aimed to make science accessible and imaginative for underserved communities. He created a 6-part curriculum explaining concepts like solar energy through storytelling, featuring characters, and developed original illustrated storybooks.



Sansara Nagpal launched **Paperbound** to promote literary representation in underserved communities. She created original illustrated books exploring feminist writing and journalism, combined with hands-on workshops, fostering a culture of inclusive literacy and empowering students to share their own stories.



Nandini Singhla created **Project BetterAlly** to build safe, inclusive spaces for learning about gender, sexuality, and allyship. She designed a 5-part curriculum, launched a curated reading list, and hosted webinars with psychologists to make allyship honest and empathetic.

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Unlocking India's Safety Net (The DBT/DPT Initiative)



This major **18 month initiative**, proudly led by the bright intern **Aryan**, addresses an important challenge faced by many communities. The project focuses on ensuring that eligible citizens receive the support available to them through **Government DBT, Direct Benefit Transfer, and DPT, Development Policy and Training, schemes**. Window to the Future notes that procedural barriers and limited awareness often prevent individuals from gaining access to essential social security, skill development opportunities, and livelihood support.

The Mission: Aryan, supported by the **Hamari Pahchan team**, will work to identify **100 beneficiaries**. The organisation will host weekly DPT sessions, offer hands on documentation support, provide legal assistance, and monitor progress through careful and detailed surveys.

The Leader's Path: While Hamari Pahchan oversees the operational execution, Aryan receives full credit as the Project Lead. It is an example of how the organisation builds ethical leaders. The model offers real world accreditation, professional recognition, strong Letters of Recommendation, and applications for national awards.

This initiative, will lead by intern **Jasmine from Step by Step School**, is about much more than a game. It is a powerful social statement designed to shatter the outdated **taboo that girls should not play football**.

The Goal: Jasmine will teaching, inspiring, and empowering young girls to take to the field, fostering health, fitness, and life skills. For girls in underserved communities, playing sports freely is often discouraged by social restrictions and family fears. **KickStart** provides a safe, structured, and celebratory environment to overcome these barriers.

The Impact: Through football, these young women gain essential life lessons: teamwork, quick-thinking, patience, and companionship. These are the skills that build powerful individuals and break generational taboos. The initiative covers basic soccer skills, exercise, nutrition, and even foundational financial knowledge, giving these girls the tools to be active, healthy, and economically aware leaders in their own lives.

This is the future of change, led by the youth, for the community.

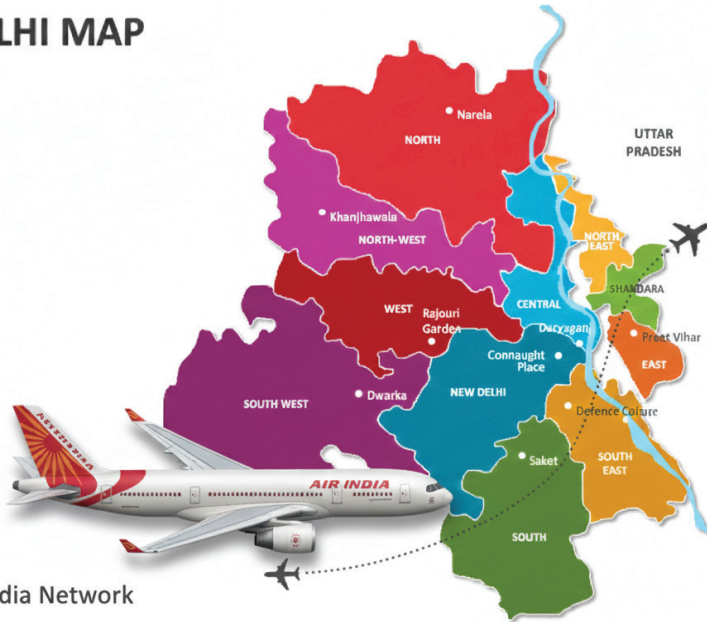
